

## Key facts to remember

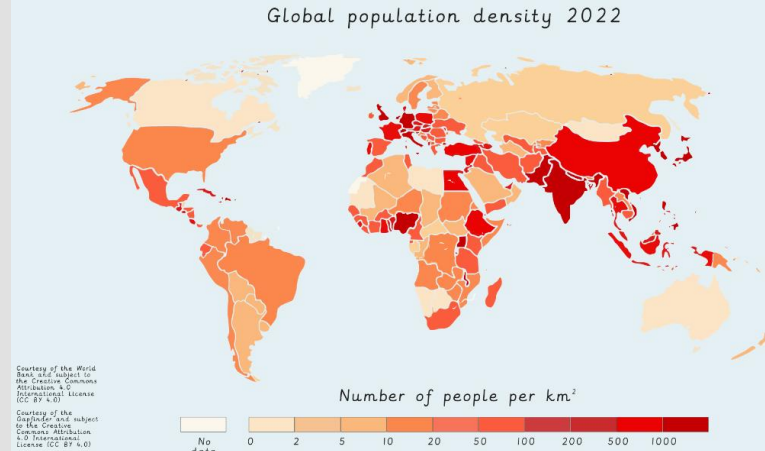
1. Population Density refers to how many people live in a certain area.
2. Population will increase when the birth rate is greater than the death rate and decrease if the death rate is greater than the birth rate
3. Migration is when people move from one place to another. There are many reasons people may move from one place to another, these can be 'push' and 'pull' factors. Blackburn has experienced significant migration over the past century, with the industrial revolution being an integral factor.
4. Climate change impacts the population by rising temperatures causing forest fires, droughts that may damage crops and lead to food shortages, and glaciers melting leading to rising sea levels, contributing to flooding.
5. Fieldwork allows us to collect real-life data and draw meaningful conclusions.

densely populated	An area that contains many people relative to its size
sparsely populated	An area that has few people relative to its size.
migration	The act of people moving from one place to another
refugee	People forced to leave their country to find safety because of conflict, violence or war.
natural increase	The difference between the number of births and the number of deaths recorded over a period
