

## Key facts to remember

1. Trade is the process of buying and selling goods. Countries worldwide trade with each other. Imports are goods that are brought into the country. Exports are goods that are traded out of the country.
2. The nature of imports and exports in Blackburn has evolved to reflect the changing global market. The UK imports a variety of products such as electrical goods and machinery. On the export side, the UK is known for its pharmaceutical products, motor vehicles and financial services.
3. Natural resources are substances that occur naturally in the environment, like wood, food, water and fossil fuels.
4. Natural resource management (NRM) manages natural resources, including water, land, soil, plants and animals.
5. Data helps us to understand patterns and trends but sometimes there can be variations due to numerous factors.

## Vocabulary

<b>Trade</b>	The process of buying and selling goods.
<b>Global Market</b>	Where goods, services and labour are exchanged throughout the entire world.
<b>Global Supply chain</b>	They are networks that can span across multiple continents and countries with a purpose of sourcing and supplying goods and services.
<b>Consume</b>	The process of using resources to satisfy human wants or needs.
<b>Distribution</b>	The way something is spread out or arranged over a geographic area.
<b>Fossil Fuels</b>	They are made from decomposing plants and animals. These fuels are found in Earth's crust and contain carbon and hydrogen which can be burned for energy.
<b>Economy</b>	Describes how a country or place is doing in making goods, and how much money it has. The amount a country sells and makes is called economic activity.
